Editorial

Student Walkouts and Punishment

The school walkouts in the recent weeks have certainly caught the attention of the general public and have surprised many community activists across the country. **Dr. Tatcho Mindiola**, Director of the Center for **Mexican American Studies** at the **University of Houston** and a long time Chicano activist, said that he never thought he would see this type of massive action again in his life time. I share **Dr. Mindiola's** view in that I also never thought I would see students taking to the streets in this fashion again.

While the students who have walked out of school because of the pending debate on immigration have shown courage and concern for their families, they have also stepped into the debate about what punishment, if any, they should be subjected to for their actions. Many callers to Spanish language radio talk shows in the **Houston** area were of the opinion that the students should be punished. Some callers stated that the absence of the students from classes was not justified by their concern over the immigration debate. Other callers believed that the students have a legitimate cause and that there should be no repercussions when they return to class.

I do not share this belief. I am of the opinion the students should be punished for walking out of school. As a former walk out student in **Uvalde, Texas** in 1970, I, along with others dared to stand up for a teacher who was being shown the door without cause. More than 600 of us walked out of the public schools in **Uvalde** and stayed out for 6 weeks in support of **Mr. Josue "George Garza."** As punishment for our actions many were

to repeat the entire year again. We had engaged in civil disobedience and there was a price to pay. I believe that the students today are engaging in civil disobedience and with civil disobedience comes consequences.

Rosa Parks, in 1955, knew that if she did not give up her seat on the bus as requested by the bus driver, she would face consequences, and she did. She went to jail. And soon thereafter the entire community of **Montgomery, Alabama** boycotted the buses for a year.

In 1973, when **Cesar Chavez** and the farmworkers in the **San Joaquin Valley** went on strike against the **Delano** table grape growers, they committed civil disobedience when they defied court orders. The judges issued injunctions to prevent the farm workers from picketing and when they refused to abide by the injunction, they were arrested. After close to 3,000 farm workers were arrested and the County Sheriff didn't have any place to put more farm workers, he stopped arresting them. These are but two examples of civil disobedience and the consequences.

I believe the students who are walking out of classes today do so in the tradition of those who believe there are social justice concerns that are bigger and more important than laws and public policies. I believe the students today are going to learn, as we did more than 35 years ago in **Uvalde**, that standing up for what you believe in is a good thing. And if you are willing to

pay the price for what you believe in, the return to you personally will be an education you can never really receive in a school or sitting down in a classroom.

The school administrators who will have to dish out the punishments have a choice, they can punish the students in a punitive way or they can punish the students in a constructive way. A punitive punishment is one that causes the student or their family time or money. A constructive punishment is one that forces the student to become more informed about the issue(s) which he or she says they are so concerned about.

In any event, the students who have been participating in these walkouts will not be returning to class as the same students who left. When people go through social actions such as walkouts, protests and strikes, they are forever changed. It is next to impossible to put the social justice genie back in the bottle once he or she has tasted the power and freedom that comes from standing up to authority. It is my view, and I am hearing this from others around the country, that we should stand by because there is more to come.

Linda Dulce Limón Passes Away

Dr. Linda Dulce Limon, wife of CMAS Director, Jose Limon, died on March 24, 2006. Linda was a 1971 UT-Austin graduate in bilingual special education and a member of the University's Mexican-American Student Organization (MASO) in the late 'sixties, later earning a doctorate in bilingual education at Texas A & I University - Kingsville.

She lived a rich life of service to our community as a special education teacher, an elementary school principal, a teacher of classical piano, college professor, and as a member and chair of many boards and commissions in Corpus Christi, Texas and for the state of Texas in advocacy of children and the fine arts.

Most recently, she served as Director of the Texas Reading Initiative for the Texas Education Agency. She was, of course, an ardent supporter of CMAS and graced many of our public events with her presence. She was buried in Corpus Christi, Texas and is survived by her husband and her daughter, Sonia Lamar Earle (Squire) and her grandson, Alexander. Dr. Jose Limon will be establishing a scholarship in her name in the College of Education.
