## **Austin City Council Vote Themselves \$33,000 Pay Raise**

**B**ack in August of this year, the **Austin City Council** voted to increase its pay by about 40 percent. Startin in January of 2023, councilmembers will receive \$116,688 a year. The Mayor, who ever that might be, will received \$134,191 a year.

It has been a while since the city council has had a significant raise and now that they are in the six figure range they can of couse breath a little eaiser. But not council members were in favor of the raise. Vanessa Fuentes, Mackenzie Kelly and Paige Ellis voted against the increase. The eight council members who voted for the raise were: Natasha Harper-Madison, Sabino "Pio" Renteria, Chito Vela, Ann Kitchen, Leslie Pool, Kathie Tovo, Alison Alter and Mayor Steve Adler.

In San Antonio, Texas no city council member makes more than \$50,000 per year. In Houston, Texas, the Mayor is paid \$236,189 per year while city council members are paid \$62,983 per year. Over in Dallas, Texas, the average base salary of a city council member is \$27,178 per year. How about El Paso, Texas? According to the *El Paso Times*, city council members now make about \$45,300 per year. The Mayor makes about \$67,950 a year.

Each city has its own unique history of how it compensates the people who are elected to goven. In most cases there is a city charter change that has to be voted upon by the voters.

## **Selected Political Statistics for Travis County**

There are a total of 38 Latino candidates on the ballot in **Travis County** for the November 8th, General Election. As Table 1 shows, these candidates are distributed among four political parties. By counting the "No Party" label it can be seen that most of the 38 candidates are running for positions that are affiliated with the Democratic Party.

Table 2 shows the Latino candidates by incumbency and gender. Most of the 38 candidates who are running for elective office are not incumbents.

Finally, Graph # 1 shows the age distribution of the 38 candiates. Those candidates who are between 29 and 39 years of age represent the largest group of Latino candidates in this General Election.

Table 3 below shows the number and percent and gender of registered voters in **Travis County**. As you examine the numbers, it can be seen that there are a total of 773,437 registered voters in **Travis County**. There are more females registered to vote than males.



## Ofelia Zapata, Austin Independent School District School Borad Trustee Answers Questions About Upcoming Election

The Austin Independent School District is once again coming to the voters and seeking approval of several bond issues that will allow it to continue to grow and build facilities for the future. We have invited school trustee Ofelia Zapata to share her thoughts on the upcoming bood election that will take place on November 8th, 2022.

La Voz: There are three bond propositions that voters will have the opportunity to vote on in November. Let's start by asking what is a bond and why do voters have to vote on one or more?

**Zapata:** A school bond proposition is when a school district asks voters for permission to sell bonds to fund capital projects such as safety improvements, modernizing aging facilities, technology upgrades and other improvements. If the proposition passes, the district can sell bonds to investors to fund the projects and pay the bonds back over time, with interest. Voters must approve school bond propositions.

La Voz: Why does the Austin Independent School District have three bonds on the ballot?

**Zapata:** State law requires that school districts separate certain bond items into different propositions for voter consideration.

**La Voz:** Share with our readers what's included in each proposition:

**Zapata: Proposition A** would fund projects such as school modernizations, security improvements and fixing critical deficiencies throughout the district including chronic HVAC, plumbing and roofing problems.

**Proposition B** would fund technology upgrades such as student and teacher devices, infrastructure



improvements and other technology upgrades.

Proposition C would fund improvements to Nelson Field, Burger Athletic Complex, Delco Activity Center and Noack Sports Complex.

La Voz: It seems as though the school district is constantly coming to the voters with bond issues to be voted upon. Given the district's declining enrollment, why is there still ongoing construction taking place?

**Zapata:** Austin ISD last asked voters to approve a bond package in 2017. All the 2017 Bond projects have been completed or are underway, and we have stayed on budget despite rising construction costs.

The district's enrollment has stabilized at around 73,000 students, and we have seen an increase in enrollment at some schools that were modernized through the 2017 Bond. The average Austin ISD school was built nearly 50 years ago and these buildings are expensive to maintain. The district has

identified approximately \$4 billion in needed repairs among our 132 schools and facilities.

In recent years, our normal operating budget, or general fund—which pays for things like salaries, utilities and supplies—has been used to pay for major repairs, reducing the amount of money available to pay for other needs, including raising teacher salaries. Last school year alone, we spent \$1,720,363 on HVAC rental equipment because we did not have sufficient operating funds to replace them outright. That's equivalent to the salary and benefits of approximately 25 teachers. Conversely, we anticipate the projects included in the 2022 Bond would save the district nearly \$6 million a year in utility costs once all of the projects are completed, an amount equivalent to the salaries and benefits of 87 teachers.

**La Voz:** I have heard that there are plans to build a new high school somewhere in **Southeast Austin.** Do any of these bonds speak to this new high school?

**Zapata:** Austin ISD acquired land in the 2008 bond for a new high school in southeast Austin where we are experiencing significant growth. The 2022 Bond will only pay to complete due diligence and pre-design work, which will reduce the time needed to construct the new school once a future bond allocates funds to build the school.

La Voz: Pues thank you for taking the time to share some of your views on the upcoming bond election with our readers.

Zapata: It was my pleasure.
