Latinos, la población más grande en Texas

El 15 de septiembre la **Oficina del Censo** reportó que lo que se ha esperado por mucho tiempo se ha actualizado. La población latina ya es más grande que la población blanca (anglosajona) en **Texas**. Por las últimas cuatro décadas proyecciones demográficas han indicado que este día llegaría. Yo empecé estudiar la demografía de

la población latina en 1980. En ese entonces era una mirada larguísima que nuestra gente sobrepasaría a la población blanca en **Texas** algún tiempo en el siglo XXI.

traducido al poder político en nuestro pueblo. Tendremos que fuertemente seguir nuestra lucha para ganar poder político y representación propia en el estado. Ojalá que se animen en esta tarea. Comencemos con el voto en la elección a mitad del mandato presidencial que llevará a cabo el 8 de noviembre. ¡Todo mundo a votar!
