The Austin Community College District Board of Trustees voted unanimously to name Dr. Richard M. Rhodes the lone finalist for the college's next president/CEO.

Dr. Rhodes currently serves as president of El Paso Community College (EPCC) and chair of the Texas Association of Community Colleges. The board will immediately begin negotiating terms of the contract and the start date.

During Dr. Rhodes' tenure at EPCC, enrollment increased 62 percent. Other significant accomplishments include the creation of the College Readiness Consortium (a partnership of EPCC, the University of Texas at El Paso, and 12 school districts), the development of several Early College High Schools (reaching a total of 365 associate degree graduates this month), implementation of dual credit/ concurrent enrollment programs with area high schools (increasing from 63 to 5,000 students over ten years), and comprehensive technological advancement.

Prior to becoming EPCC president in 2001, Dr. Rhodes was vice president of business services at Salt Lake Community College in Salt Lake City, Utah. Dr. Rhodes earned his Ph.D. in Community College Leadership from the University of Texas at Austin, interning at ACC in the early nineties. "I've been a fan of ACC for a long time, so this is an honor and a privilege," says Dr. Rhodes.

I understand your concerns - and we agree that kids in East Austin deserve a better education then they have received.

Please understand that the cost savings to AISD does not come in the form of the lease value, but rather the annual maintenance and operating budget - by leasing the campus to East Austin Prep, AISD will save \$80-100 million over the 10 years. These are funds that can be redirected to keeping good schools in Austin open and good teachers and staff employed.

Regarding your valid concerns about what happens to students already enrolled at Eastside Memorial, as we have expressed before, we are happy to work with AISD to find the best solutions for those students - many of who may already be transferring from other areas. There are many options, whether it be partnering with another free public charter school or co-locating until the current high school classes graduate. This is something we need to have AISD at the table to speak with us about to find the best

The East Austin Prep Academy is a tuition-free public charter school with an open enrollment policy, with preference given to kids in the Govalle/Johnston Terrace neighborhood and then opening it to all East Austin students. As you know, charter schools offer parents choice in terms of educating their children and are started in response to the community's needs. The school anticipates it will be open to about 800 students within the next few years.

The challenges AISD is facing in this budget cycle are not one-time budget challenges, given what is happening statewide. As you know, Eastside Memorial (Johnston) has been low performing for more than a decade and AISD has indicated that it will need to propose a new reconstitution plan (which ultimately must be approved by TEA and the Commissioner of ED). This plan includes yet another new education lab model, school/ academy consolidation and/or closure. It is time for the community to take things into it's own hands and for there to be other alternatives considered - with a collaborative mindset to better serve the students and families in East Austin. And this proposal presents an opportunity for community, public charter schools and AISD to partner to bring quality education to East Austin.

Why Should African Americans Celebrate Cinco de Mayo?

Three Questions

What is Cinco de Mayo?

Why do we celebrate it here in the United Status of America?

Why should Black Americans celebrate this holiday?

In a nutshell, Cinco de Mayo is about an event that took place in Mexico in 1862. On this date, the 5th of May, a rag tag army of Mexicans, led by a general who was born in Texas, defeated the most powerful army in the world in the small town of Puebla. The French, who had come to Mexico to "collect" on an overdue debt and were so shocked that a bunch of Mexicans hiding behind rocks and trees could inflict so much damage, that they were forced to retreat and regroup. The French came back and not only took Puebla, but all of Mexico and ruled the country for several years. That is the basic story.

Next question – Why is **Cinco** de Mayo celebrated in the **United States of America?** According to Dr. David E. Hayes-Bautista in a paper published by the UCLA Center for the Study of Latino Health and Culture about the origin of Cinco de Mayo in the United States, the modern American focus on that day first started in California in the 1860s. Bautista writes, "Far up in the gold country town of Columbia (now Columbia State Park) Mexican miners were so overjoyed at the news that they spontaneously fired off rifles shots and fireworks, sang patriotic songs and made impromptu speeches."The 2007



UCLA paper notes that "The holidav, which has been celebrated in California continuously since 1863, is virtually ignored in Mexico. Cinco de Mavo is important to California because it was invented here," said Hayes-Bautista, who is the director of the center. "It provides a collective identity for all Latinos, whether they were born here in California or immigrated from Mexico, Central America or South America. It binds them together in an identity — it is as important to Latinos as the Alamo is to Anglo-Texans."

The paper by Hayes-Bautista and co-author Cynthia L. Chamberlin, the center's historian, appeared in the Southern California Quarterly and is titled "Cinco de Mayo's First Seventy-Five Years in Alta California: From Spontaneous Behavior to Sedimented Memory, 1862 to 1937."

Los Angeles, California has had an annual Cinco de Mayo celebration for the past 138 years. In Tuscon, Arizona, school board minutes state: new holiday S inaugurated in 1910, two days being given off May 5 and 6 for Mexican celebration "Cinco de Mayo."

In the May , 1913

issue of **La Prensa**, a Spanish Language weekly in **San Antonio**, **Texas**, a picture of **General Ignacio Zaragoza** is on the cover, and a poem about him

can be found on the literary page along with an interview with a veteran of the battle. In the following week's edition, the newspaper gave a summary of

celebrations held in **Waco** and **Austin**. In **Houston**, **Texas**, Mexicanos were celebrating **Cinco de Mayo** as early as 1935.

Why should Black Americans celebrate Cinco de Mayo?

Now for the last question, why should **Black Americans** celebrate an incident that took place in **Mexico?** To answer this question properly we have to go into a little more detail. Let us start with why the **French** had

sailed across the Atlantic to collect on a debt. Recall that Mexico had lost almost half its territory to the United States in the Mexican American War **1846-1848.** Afterwards, internal politics, personalities and conflicts put further stress on the country. Three costly years of civil war over the implementation of the Mexican Constitution of 1857 had just ended. The Constitution's defenders, the Liberals, defeated the Conservative opposition, with both sides taking expensive loans. Once in power, the Liberal government faced a severe fiscal

On July 17, 1861 President Benito Juárez ordered the suspension of foreign debt payments for a period of two

years, citing the great financial difficulties of the country and promising to continue repayment after this moratorium. In response, **Great Britain**, **Spain** and **France** signed a tripartite agreement and sent military forces to take the customhouse in the port of **Veracruz** as a means of securing repayment.

By January, 1862, all three nations landed troops outside **Veracruz.**

The intention was to force Mexico into negotiations. Unfortunately, not all the parties were concerned solely with debt repayment. Napoleon III sought to establish a monarchy in Mexico to restore French influence in the Western hemisphere. This idea was not new. As early as 1844, the French Minister to Mexico drew up plans for the invasion and the

imposition of a French prince. Napoleon's goals were further encouraged by Conservative exiles, who saw a monarchy as a means of preserving their privileges, and the support of the surviving Conservative opposition. When it became clear that the French had no intention of leaving Mexico after successful debt negotiations, the tripartite agreement was dissolved and the British and Spanish forces withdrew from Mexico.

The United States with Abraham Lincoln as President. was in the midst of the Civil War. But he and his administration were following the events in Mexico with great concern. Given the secession of the South, European intervention in Mexico might have led to a more active French role in the American Civil War. Napoleon III had sympathies toward the Confederacy and the creation of a hostile French puppet state would affect Northern foreign policy and wartime strategy. Though the **United States** took steps to organize a peaceful mediation, the Administration remained worried about antagonizing the French. Thus, the United States took no active role in aiding Mexico, even refusing to sell arms for its defense.

The French army then marched on the capital. With only the moral support of the Latin American nations. Mexico confronted the possible destruction of its national sovereignty and its absorption into the **French** colonial empire. The French forces were experienced, trained and wellequipped. There was little doubt about the outcome of a battle.

French commander, General Lorencez, contemptuously wrote on April 26, "we have over the Mexicans such superiority of race, organization, discipline, morality,..." Still, Mexico was determined to offer total resistance. "We must now prove to France and to the entire world that we are worthy to be free," wrote President Benito Juárez.

The Battle of Puebla

Mexico's defense was entrusted to Ignacio Zaragoza, a young 33-year old Liberal general. After maneuvering for position, Zaragoza decided to defend the city of Puebla, Mexico's second largest city. As the last defensible city en route to the capital, it offered only improvised fortifications. Soldiers took up hasty defensive positions and prepared for the worst. Poorly armed, these 4,850 Mexicans awaited the arrival of 6,500 French.

On the night of May 3, Zaragoza told his staff that "We must promise to die in our positions, given that it is illogical to pretend to achieve some victory with armaments so inferior to the enemy's; but we will try ... causing him the greatest amount of damage."



In the early morning of May 5, French infantry battalions approached the defensive positions with little worry and expectations of a quick defeat. Demonstrating his confidence in an easy victory, General Lorencez formed two columns of troops and immediately ordered a frontal assault against the two major **Mexican** positions. Taking advantage of this reckless attack, Zaragoza skillfully redeployed his troops to blunt the direct French assaults. Charging in mass toward Mexicans, the disciplined French troops expected the defenders to flee because of fear and panic. Instead, the trim red and blue uniforms of the French were of no protection against the concentrated fire of old muskets. During the entire day, the **French** attacked three times in this manner, incredulous at the amount of resistance. Each time they were forced back by the Mexican defenders, leaving the field strewn with their wounded.

After the final assault, Colonel Porfirio Díaz disobeyed orders and counter-attacked, forcing the French withdrawal. By 5 p.m., General Lorencez recognized his defeat and retreated to **Veracruz**. Nearly five hundred

French soldiers were left behind, either dead or bleeding in the Mexican trenches.

Immediately, France deployed 3 0 , 0 0 0 additional troops. Now committed to establishing a monarchy, the French army

eventually defeated the Mexicans at Puebla in 1863. However, the Battle of Puebla delayed French occupation by a year. During this respite, Mexico organized and prepared for this war, which would finally end with a French withdrawal in 1867. The 1862 French defeat eliminated their posible aid to the Confederacy.

By the time of the coronation of Napoleon's representative, Archduke Maximilian, and the French consolidation in 1864. the fighting in the Civil War shifted to the **North's** advantage. Any French assistance would be politically unwise and of limited value to the losing South.

In sum, the Mexicans were able to tie up and keep the French busy so that they did not have the time or resources to aid the Confederacy. Some have speculated that had the French not been tripped up by the Mexicans, they would have helped the South and the outcome of the Civil War may have turned out differently. And if it did, the question of slavery may have been debated and delayed for many years to come. The Battle of Puebla, and the refusal of the Mexicans to give up is why Black Americans should also celebrate El Cinco de Mayo.

Nearly 700 Austin first grade students arrived at the Travis County Exposition Center recently, ready to "Read to a Horse." In preparation for the field trip, the students from

Allan, Allison, Galindo, Govalle, Jordan, Oak Springs, Overton, and Pease Elementary schools spent three weeks practicing reading the popular children's book "Little Black, A Pony."

The Black Stallion Literacy Foundation provided each student with a book, and transported two horses, portrayed as characters in the book, to each campus.



Project coordinator Ramsay Mudgett said that the Foundation provides the hard cover books "to encourage the children not to learn to read, but to love to read."



Barbara Jordan Elementary
School teacher Andrew
Holmes said that meeting the
horses prior to receiving the
book "helped my students
to personalize the horses in
the book. Most had never
met a horse. It also helped to
develop their creativity, and
knowing that field trip was

planned, gave them the incentive to practice their reading skills."

Holmes added that with state and federally funded reading programs in jeopardy of losing funds, programs like the Black Stallion — that put books in children's hands — are extremely important.



At the conclusion of the field trip, each od the almost 700 students received another book from the Foundation, "Little Black Goes to the Circus." The books were waiting for the students in their campus' library. "We want children to learn that reading can take you places that you would like to visit, and that this often happens in libraries," Mudgett said.

The Black Stallion Literacy Foundation

raises funds throughout the year to purchase the books, transport the horses, and host the learning stations at the Center. Other sponsors include Turnquist Partners Reality and Five Points Arabian Horse Association, which also provides volunteers.

Texas State recognized as **Hispanic Serving Institution**

The U.S. Department of Education has granted Texas State University-San Marcos official recognition as a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI). To receive the HSI designation, an institution must have an enrollment of undergraduate full-timeequivalent students that is at least 25 percent Hispanic. Texas State surpassed the 25 percent Hispanic undergraduate enrollment level in September 2010.

"We are proud that our enrollment reflects the true changing face of Texas. We have achieved this important outcome because of the efforts of many

individuals across the university, and I sincerely appreciate those efforts," said Texas State President Denise Trauth. Achieving HSI status will mean the establishment of new goals, said Trauth.

"It has been our goal for several years to become an HSI. Now it is time we direct our efforts toward becoming the best HSI in the state," said Trauth. "It is not enough to recruit talented students from all ethnicities – we must also continue to retain those students and see that they graduate. We will continue to deliver exceptional educational opportunities for all of our students." In 2010, Texas State was one of four institutions nationally cited for academic policies and programs that better serve Latino students. **Texas State** is the fourth – and the largest – HSI in Texas.

The **Department of Education HSI program** provides grants that allow schools to expand educational opportunities for Hispanic students. HSI grants also allow schools to expand and enhance their academic offerings, program quality and institutional stability. Texas State is now eligible to apply for grants under the HSI program. In 2010, the Department of Education awarded grants totaling more than \$60 million to HSIs.
